## What is Salmonella?

Salmonella is a bacteria that causes diarrhea, fever, and stomach pain. It usually spreads through contact with animals or contaminated food.

# Why do I need to stay home?

- Salmonella often spreads to others when people do not properly wash their hands after touching animals or poop, or before making food.
- While most people feel better after 4–7 days, bacteria may be in your poop even after you don't feel sick anymore, which can make others sick.
- Illness spreads easily in some situations including food service, childcare, and healthcare.
- Salmonella may cause very serious illness. We want to keep those we care for healthy!

### If you work or attend a high-risk setting, extra exclusions may apply.



**Food service:** Utah Food Code requires the following before you return to work:

- 2 negative tests 24 hours apart and 48 hours after antibiotics are finished,
- or wait **30 days** after diarrhea and vomiting have stopped,
- or wait **30 days** after positive test if no symptoms are present.



#### **Childcare:**

- Stay home until diarrhea and vomiting have stopped. This includes **kids** who attend childcare facilities and **childcare workers**.
- If you give medication or have food handling duties, follow food service guidelines above.



#### Healthcare and long-term care facilities:

- Stay home from work until diarrhea and vomiting have stopped; negative poop samples may also be required by the local health department.
- If you give medication or have food handling duties, follow food service guidelines above.
